

LAKE UNION NEWS

Ideas, studies, surveys, hopes and hours of work have been crystallized in the newest attempt to do something of a structured and permanent nature about Lake Union. Last week, Mayor Uhlman came out with an endorsement of a plan designed by the Department of Community Development, using as their basis, the Lake Union Action Plan(Joyce, Copeland, Vaughn), a study prepared by the Lake Union Association(Clayton Young) and a potpourri of other plans for doing something with the Lake.

The plan calls for a waterfront residential zone on the East Shore of the Lake, and a mixed commercial zone on the West side of the Lake. That the mayor came out against highrise around the lake is significant for all the people. He said in his introductory letter " the time has come to declare that the interest of the people must be paramount and to move forward with proposals for a new zoning pattern on Lake Union which will encourage its diversity while protecting its unique features.

A PUBLIC HEARING that we hope many of you will attend is scheduled for Tuesday, November 28th in the City Council Chambers(11th floor Municipal Bldg.) at 7:30 in the Evening. We have a copy of the plan and more copies are available at the Dept. of Community Development. Also, from that Dept., a planner will be assigned to work on the problem full time, to develop alternatives. By March zoning will be established.

This is an important positive step toward the preservation of Lake Union, a unique in-city shoreline, that belongs to so many people, and greatly affects so many people.

This means that we must continue to work with city government. Come to the planning commission meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 28th at 7:30 11th Floor Municipal Bldg. Ask a neighbor to go with you.

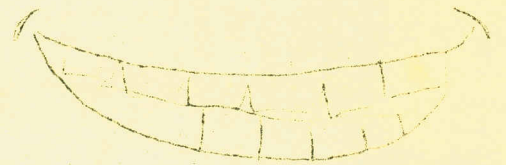

SUPREME COURT HEARING

On November 13, at 9 A.M. Several members of Eastlake Community Council and Floating Homes Association went to Olympia to hear the oral argument for our case versus the Roanoke Reef Associates. We were represented by Harold Green and Francis Hoague of MacDonald, Hoague and Bayless, and by Robert Jensen from the State Department of Ecology. Each side was allowed 40 minutes to present argument, questions and rebuttal. A decision will not be made by the court for at least one month, possibly more. Points of the case that seemed of greatest interest to the court were: a) the mlegality of the

original permit issued by the city of Seattle and b) the use of the public street end (Roanoke) for access to private property. Hopefully the Supreme Court of the State of Washington will decide in our favor, and the galactic structure will come down. . . . ed.

OCTOBER ANNUAL MEETING



TRANSIT CARDS FOR ELDERLY



Registration for the Seattle Transit System's reduced fare program for the elderly will begin tomorrow and continue through Sunday. Registration will be from 8 A.M. to 5 P.M. daily in the Food Circus at Seattle Center. The City's new reduced fare program will permit persons 65 and older to obtain a \$2 monthly pass which will entitle them to ride city buses as often as they want, at any hour of the day. Persons who ride the bus less frequently may pay 10 cents a ride instead of buying the \$2 pass.

To qualify for the reduced fare, however, the elderly have been asked to go to the Food Circus to register, to obtain an identification card.

Applications forms are available at retirement homes, city fire stations, branch libraries and in Park Department recreation Centers. Please fill out the application at home and take it to the Food Circus.

Transit will operate free shuttle buses from downtown Seattle to the Food Circus during the registration period. Applicants may also ride the monorail to the Center without paying a fare. City Shuttle buses will operate from a special loading area at the Northeast corner of Fourth Ave. and Pine Street and at regular bus stops at First Ave. and Union Street (northbound) and at Second Ave. and Pike Street (eastbound.)

At the last Board meeting plans were discussed for this year's agenda. There is much to do and we broke down the work into several committees as follows:

1. Land Use and Zoning Committee, perhaps the most important and difficult task, protecting the neighborhood from future "RR" projects and working to maintain the proper balance between growth and stability. This Committee is Headed by John Cowll: EA-9-4264.
2. Traffic Control Committee, to reduce auto traffic and increase car-pool and transit traffic. Ease traffic on Eastlake Ave. and Fairview Ave. by the use of transit and car pool lanes, bike lanes, street ends, etc. Committee chaired by Paul Trush: EA-4-6201, and G. de Grasse: EA-3-0926.
3. Community Center Committee, to obtain use of Seward School as a community center where we could have an office, social room, gym classes and activities. So far we have met with heavy opposition having been told it can't be done. SO; with support from the community this project could gain momentum and success. The steering committee includes: Dave Kelly: ME-4-3470, Anita Klapper: EA-5-9333, Gretchen de Grasse: EA-3-0926, Paul Trush: EA-4-6201.
4. Social Committee, established for the entertainment and edification of the community at large. Designed to accomodate all people from zealous argonauts to clear-headed card(bingo too!) players. Plans are in the offing for a ski club, perhaps with overnight facilities available to us. Sue Sink is the Chairwoman: EA-5-5849, and has brainstormed several ideas.
5. Beautify and Identify Committee, a wonderful committee to embellish the neighborhood with signs, murals, planters, trees, headed by Bonnie Brawn and Dave Kelly, call: ME-4-3470 or EA-9-4659.
6. Handyman Guide Committee, to establish a guide of reliable plumbers roofers, gardeners, electricians, painters, etc. for people to call when they need help. We have no chairperson. . . HELP.
