STATEMENT

"In order to achieve these ends the I-90 Citizens Committee requests that the City of Seattle begin immediately negotiating with the Washington State Highway Dept. for rehabilitation and restoration of the I-90 community, and that the Mayor of the city of Seattle and Governor of the State of Washington immediately, under the authority of the 1973 Federal-Aid Highway Act, request transfer of funds from Interstate purposes to mass transit purposes, and that emphasis be on development of `a workable city mass transit system in cooperation with METRO."

UNION AT NEWTON

On April 21st, the Eastlake Community will celebrate Earth Day at the Newton Street Park. The park marks the transition between the living and working portions of the lake. It is the point where the ECC proposed last year to put in a cul de sac to limit traffic on Fairview to inhance the residential quality of the area to the North. The park itself has been largely sponsored by Marty Klapper, as has the Earth Day Celebration each year. This year his efforts seem to have triggered some productive cooperation. Terry Pettus of the Floating Homes Association has been joined by James Francis, President of the Lake Union Association, in a combined effort to realize the Newton Street projects, with the Eastlake Community.

The problems with the park are simple, we are relying on donated services and labor, following a similar course as was taken with the Lynn Street Park. As materials are made available, improvements are made. With the help of the Lake Union Association there may be some surprising developements, The traffic thing is another matter. After several months of inaction, a memo was sent from the Mayor's office to the Engineering Department requseting the status of the project and requesting quick action on the ECC proposals. That was November 10. On February 15, the Engineering Department responded, outlining costs to the tune of \$100,000! On the receipt of this information ECC gagged. The costs were restrictive to the absurd. But since we have some competent engineers experienced in these matters, it was decided to define the costs ourselves. Phil Keightly and Mark Clemmens have offered to clarify the matter. And now we have found that \$110,000 in street access funds are available to us. It may be too early to be optimistic, but those monies may be helpful for the underfunded bikeway as well. This will be a subject to consider at the next meeting.
