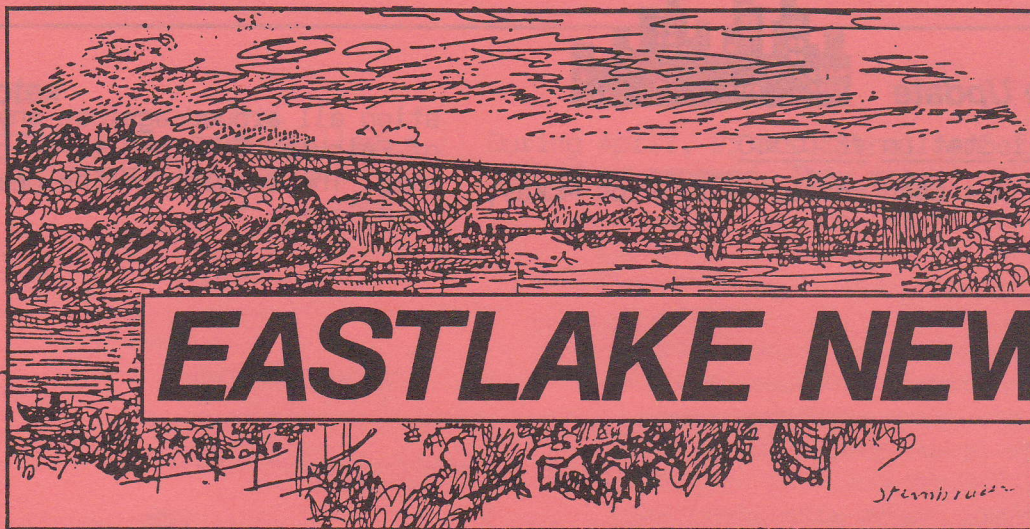

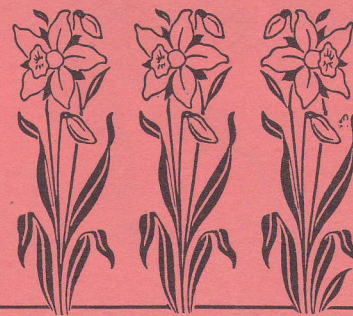
Elections

The Eastlake Gardener

It's May already, and many Eastlake residents have been hard at work planting vegetable gardens. Though these eager beavers probably have a head start on the rest of us, it's not too late to plant your crop of favorites.

For those who don't have access to a yard, or who prefer container gardening, there are many vegetable crops which can be grown successfully in containers. Though most any vegetable can be planted, those with small root systems are sometimes more successful in containers. Carrots, onions, lettuce, peppers, eggplant and tomatoes are but a few likely subjects for container vegetables. When choosing tomatoes, be aware of the hybrid named patio, which produces a more medium sized tomato than the smaller cherry variety. In addition, almost any herb can be grown on a patio or porch.

Although terra cotta containers are more picturesque, your vegetable crop will require more watering than plantings in plastic or metal containers. Sometimes a metal bucket within a more decorative container will be preferred, as this arrangement provides more flexibility. Soil for container gardening should be rich with peat moss, loam, and sand (not salty beach sand). A fertilizer high in nitrogen (23-19-17 is a good one) will help. Remember that after the growing season any nutrients in the soil will be exhausted and another plant should not be planted in the same soil.
