2343 Eastlake

The DCLU has re-issued its decision on this proposed four-story office building. Jules James has details and opinions.

Vivian Darst's proposal for a contract re-zone to operate a flower stand at the corner of Harvard and Roanoke has reached the Hearing Examiner. Many hours of testimony have been given already, and the hearing will resume February 9th.

2356 Yale--10-unit apartment

The appeal of this project was withdrawn following the disclosure by the landowner to the immediate south of the project site that another ten units have been planned.

Eastlake Transportation Study

Work on the Eastlake Neighborhood Transportation Study has come to a temporary halt. Expect a resumption of this effort by Seattle Engineering at some time in the future.

2048 Fairview, 32-unit condo.

Oral arguments were held before City Council on February 6th. Speaking for the Eastlake Community Council and the Floating Homes Assocation was Bill Keasler, President of Floating Homes.

URBAN DESIGNS WHICH WORK AWARDS

Visitors from other cities are often struck by the natural beauty of Seattle but rarely praise the quality of the built environment.

We need a clearer vision of how we want Seattle to look; we need to give clearer direction to our builders.

A city-sponsored awards program on 'URBAN DESIGNS WHICH <u>WORK</u>' would help raise everyone's design consciousnéss: citizens, government officials and developers.

The program would give public recognition to elements and details of buildings which are "welldone" and contribute to the city-scape.

The awards process would go beyond praise to explain <u>how</u> and <u>why</u> the building works and what we can learn from it.

The Design Awards process would focus the public's attention on examples of what is "good," which buildings work in one way or another, what elements are successful. It would be another forum for us to express our view--with real examples--of what Seattle should look like.

Heretofore, discussions have been too "theoretical." I took part in a citizens advisory group at the City of Seattle over the last few years and in 20 meetings there was not one mention of specific buildings--pro or con--to illuminate our discussions.

We need a process in which all the fancy planning gobbledegook and architect-babble is brought down to earth and we examine in public why some buildings succeed in contributing to the community and why some do not. One way to determine what to do in the future is to examine what has worked in the past, and why.

We could invite some designers/builders/urban critics to jury the award nominations; they would pay attention to the award winner's consistency/or lack thereof with City policies; the award winners would receive plaques which they could attach to their

Fourplex Fire



The Eastlake neighborhood is the proud recipient of 11 "Fairview Recreational Bike Route" signs spread strategically from Fairview to Fuhrman.




Firewood Co-op



building or design. Each year we would focus on a different design problem of a landscape. For example: awnings over storefronts, carports, parking lots for more than 20 cars, parking garages, commercial building next to residential areas, downtown plazas, etc.

There are lots of design problems and the point of the awards will be to recognize those answers which have solved the problem well. I think it's important that the emphasis be on systems and context rather than a reinforcing of the unhealthy emphasis on the building as a solitary, unique manifestation of the designer/developer's "genius".

A great city is made not from a collection of great buildings but from a great zoning code. There must be some vision--articulated by the prosaic zoning code-to guide the developer and architect. This will not happen overnight but must emerge out of the increase in consciousness of the people.
