Candidate for President:

More uproar may be needed; property owners who had not yet received their assessments are now getting them, and again the increases are way high. Apartment Yards: The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly

It was painful again this summer to watch some shrubs and trees wither from lack of water. Even a few homeowners were responsible but the worst neglect was at absentee-owned apartment buildings. Beautiful shrubs die and the yards fill with weeds and blackberry brambles that can overwhelm the sidewalk. Apartment owners may even rip out existing plants and replace them with crushed lava that spills over onto sidewalk and street, yet doesn't really stop the weeds. Several on Minor Avenue E. even opposed a City offer to restore asphalted planting strips back into gardens during the recent sewer reconstruction. This reminds us of the Dickens character who "knew the cost of everything and the value of nothing." At the current rental rates, aren't renters entitled to nice landscaping? To keep a yard looking nice, surely some renters will pitch in to water when plants need it. The bad and ugly yards show lack of respect for neighbors, and for the apartment owners (write to us about your favorites) who put real money and muscle power into keeping their yards looking good.

Some of the most beautiful landscaping is not residential at all, but by neighborly local businesses. Think of the colorful flower boxes installed last year

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
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Remembering Olive Jorgens

Seattle lost one of its finest citizens February 12 when Olive Jorgens died at the age of 94. Olive died at home at 216 E. Roanoke Street, an apartment house (the one with the lions out front) that she had owned for 25 years. Born in North Dakota, Olive moved to Seattle in 1923, and spent 28 years teaching in the public schools. For her training as a teacher, she observed classes at our own Seward School, even then a demonstration site for the latest and best teaching techniques.

Olive was a creative and caring teacher still remembered

by pupils a half century later. She was a generous and caring landlord who kept the apartment house in excellent condition and the rents low. Olive shared an apartment in the building with her sister Janet, whose nursing, assistance, and sisterly devotion made it possible for her to remain at home throughout years of declining health. Janet is an experienced hair stylist, and kept Olive's beautiful hair in fine form to the very end. Both joined the Eastlake Community Council early, and have staunchly supported its work. The neighborhood cherishes the inspiration of Olive and Janet Jorgens.

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OUR HELP IS NEEDED TO PUT "GREEN" IN THE FRANKLIN GREEN STREET

The mounds of dirt and broken concrete that appeared outside of Seward/TOPS School in early September marked the beginning of work on East-lake's first "green street."

The 2500 block of Franklin Avenue, between Seward/TOPS School and Rogers Playfield, has been closed to through traffic since the 1940s, but it was only last year that the City permanently designated the block a Type IV "green street", making it into a park-like street and off-limits to all but emergency vehicles.

The School District's heavy construction work is the first step toward implementing the Franklin Green Street design prepared in 1997 by the East-lake community, TOPS and Seattle School District. The design includes an active play area for kids, a ramp between the Green Street and Rogers Playfield, a quiet area under the existing tree canopy, artist-designed benches and kiosks, and a new central overlook that connects the School with the Playfield.

The design also calls for new trees and other plants--lots of them!

The ECC and TOPS have a grant from the City to buy the plants, but we need your help to get them in the ground and to keep them healthy after they are planted. Based on the current construction schedule, we expect to be planting sometime in late October through November. We need all kinds of people to help out--from those who can easily swing a shovel or help lift a tree, to those who can check in and help coordinate volunteers. We also need people who can help water the plants once they are in the ground (water is available in the Green Street). All volunteer time counts as match toward our \$91,000 grant from the City.


